STEP 2 OF BC's Re-Opening Plan EFFECTIVE TODAY

EFFECTIVE TODAY, BRITISH COLUMBIA RESIDENTS CAN HAVE GATHERINGS, TRAVEL THE PROVINCE, AND STAY OUT LATER AT BARS AND RESTAURANTS.



Step 2 of BC's Restart Plan comes into effect today with groups of up to 50 being allowed for outdoor personal gatherings and sporting events, indoor seated gatherings with an adequate safety plan, as well as movie theatres and banquet halls.

Religious organizations will be able to host indoor services again with an adequate safety plan in place. Up to 50 people or 10% of the buildings capacity, whichever number is greater, is acceptable. Liquor establishments will also be able to extend serving now until midnight. As for provincial travel, the ban was been lifted on travel within the province. There is still an advisory for out-of-province non-essential travel. If you are travelling, plan ahead and be respectful of safety measures in place.

This transition into Step 2 of the re-opening plan is in line with key metrics for moving forward. Over 75% of adults are vaccinated with their first dose which exceeded the minimum threshold of 65%. These are the new regulations that come with moving to step 2:

- Recreational travel within British Columbia, including non-essential travel, is permitted.
- Outdoor and indoor(seated) personal gatherings allowed a maximum of 50 people.
- Indoor religious gatherings can allow a maximum of 50 people or 10% of the capacity within their location, whichever number is greated.
- Maximum of 50 spectators for outdoor sports.
- Restaurants, bars, and pubs can extend their liquor service until midnight
- Indoor sports games with no spectators permitted
- High-intensity fitness with safety plans permitted

The target date for the province to move into Step 3 is July 1st with the hope of moving into Step 3 come September 7th. Since the restart plan launched on May 25th, the provincial government has been working with communities and sector associations to help prepare for the transition Step 3 brings when public health orders are lifted. The restart plan was developed based on the data and guidance received from the BC Centre for Disease Control. The progression towards each step of the plan is closely measured by the number of vaccinations and case counts.

HIGHWAY RESURFACING COMMENCES IN EAST KOOTENAY

Prepare for delays in your drive between Fairmont Hot Springs and Invermere and near Moyie.

41 kilometres of highway are set to be resurfaced between the two areas. A 14KM stretch of road on Highway 3 between Irishman Creek and Moyie Townsite will be resurfaced with an estimate end date around October. There will be several roads in Fairmont Hot Springs and Westside Road between Fairmont and Invermere which is a 27KM road set for resurfacing.

The resurfacing of these two areas are part of a bigger project which is expected to restore more than 500KM of highway in the southern interior of British Columbia.

WATER ADVISORY ALERT LIFTED FOR KIMBERLEY



Kimberley residents can stop boiling water for drinking as the City has lifted the community water quality advisory.

It is common for a water supply to have increased turbidity or cloudiness after a spring run-off due to the particles found within the water.

The Manager of Communication for the City of Kimberley has advised the water quality is considered good according to Interior Health Guidelines. Turbidity levels have dropped below 1 NTU which means it is safe for consumption.

Highway 93 is a scenic drive even in the rain, and very green right now. There is a 15 km no stopping area just east of Radium so be prepared that some planned hikes may not be possible. Ironically all bears, both Grizzlies and Black Bears have been outside of the nostopping bear zone and prove they are wide awake and mobile. Make sure to review bear awareness information and be prepared.

If you are planning on doing any adventures in the national parks over multiple days, pick up a Discovery pass <u>pc.gc.ca/en/voyage-travel/</u> admission. The pass can be purchased at Kootenay Park entrance but also available online. With the future looking promising for being able to travel outside of our own community, future explorations of the multiple parks close by is highly likely, so we opted for a Family pass. The Family pass is the same cost as 2 individuals so it's great if you're expecting the kids, grandkids or friends for a visit.

Marble Canyon is a short easy hike and with lots of water flowing right now, spectacular. Even in the rain, trails were in good shape and if you like waterfalls worth the walk.

The Paint Pots trail was the other stop. This is one hike that might be better in drier conditions. Wearing white is not recommended. One family encountered on the hike had us chuckling with the kids' comments of "so cool" to "I don't like walks anymore". The first part is a lovely stroll through a wooded area to a bridge. Once you've crossed the bridge it is a short walk to where we encountered coloured mud which was cool but also very wet & messy.

Someone has strategically put down wood planks, skinny trees and metal piping so unless you want to be up to ankles in coloured muddy water or grass that is actually more muddy water, do the balancing act, orange mud is a great incentive not to step off. The trail was messy but fun and definitely different. There is a low waterfall area along the side of the trail, currently with more debris than water on it but when else do you get to see orange water running?

Extra quick add on is the Numa Falls viewing & picnic area. Longer trail after the falls is currently closed.

Before you go, check out parkscanada.gc.ca/ kootenaytrails (on smart phone) for trail conditions and more trail specific information. Note if using a laptop, the link is <u>pc.gc.ca/en/pnnp/bc/kootenay/activ/randonnee-hike/etat-</u> <u>sentiers-trail-conditions</u>.

Look this up prior to entering the park. Once in the park remember no cell service.

Always remember pack it in, pack it out.

I understand when I start the game, unless there's a tutorial, and even if there is, chances are I'll be given very little information to start the game. I'll have to figure out basically everything for myself. I get it.

Green Hell takes these survival mechanics and brings it to a whole new, realistic, level. You're in the jungle and the game has a fantastic atmosphere and locations that keep you on your toes. You'll feel threatened the entire time you are playing this game because you are never safe. At any point in time you could be attacked by other tribe members, jaguars, parasitic worms, scorpions, the list goes on. This is a survival game you shouldn't sleep on.

The story mode is a success which is difficult to achieve in survival games. You can try the survival mode instead, however I suggest going through the story tutorial first because you'll have to in the end anyways. The game has a great way of lulling you into a false sense of security at times while you're at camp either cooking, resting, or gathering yourself for your next venture into the jungle. There are a variety of difficulty levels to choose from that allow for a wide range of experiences across different play types. You can even create a custom game so you can choose the level of severity you have to survive in.

Whether you want to face continual threats of starvation, attacks from predators and hostile tribes, you have the option to customize the game completely for your play style. My number one tip for this game – only resource the items you need for the time. Getting too full can cause you to lose valuable resources you need in the moment.
