

CITY OF FERNIE RECEIVES FUNDING FOR JOBS TO REDUCE WILDFIRE RISK

BRITISH COLUMBIA IS BACK UNDER THE STATE OF EMERGENCY MANDATE

As of July 21st at 12:00am, the province of British Columbia was placed under a state of emergency in support of the ongoing wildfire situation running rampant across the province.

The announcement was made by the Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General after receiving recommendations from the BC Wildfire Service and Emergency Management BC.

Calling the state of emergency provides more support to federal, provincial, and local governments to protect the public.

In a quote reported by myeastkootenaynow.com,

"Public safety is always our first priority, and as wildfire activity is expected to increase, this is a progressive step in our wildfire response to make sure British Columbia has access to extraordinary powers under the Emergency Program Act," Farnworth said.

"In a briefing last night, I received word that we'll be facing a few days of very difficult weather in the Interior. This declaration will address the potential of a mass evacuation scenario and provide our government with the means to secure the accommodation spaces necessary to house our citizens, if necessary."

As of July 20th, the province reported a total of 299 wildfires currently active in B.C. Alongside these wildfires are 40 evacuation orders and 69 evacuation alerts. More than 3000+ firefighters and resource staff are currently working hard to fight the wildfires across the province. As the wildfires continue to rage, more area restrictions are also put in place such as an area around Mineral Creek. The area restriction is from Panorama north end to Mount Katherine south end. Ben Able lake access has also been closed along with Toby Creek Road to traffic. This is in response to the 58 hectare sized wildfire currently active in Mineral Creek about 25 kilometers southwest of Invermere.

As reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, here are the current notable fires in the region:

Three other wildfires of note are burning in the region, the largest fire is the 2,665-hectare Cultus Creek wildfire, west of Kootenay Lake.

Although, the BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) said the fire will not be considered a fire of note by the end of the day on Monday.

The Evacuation Order has been downgraded to an Alert for properties between Midge Creek and Next Creek.

Signage has been posted to alert the public that Midge Creek Park is closed.

No firefighting equipment is on the scene of the blaze.

"Firefighters completed objectives around the Tye Beach cabins the afternoon of Sunday, July 25. Some equipment remains on-site in the event the need arises to return and protect structures. BCWS personnel will continue to monitor this fire, which remains very active," said BCWS officials.

Across the lake, the Akokli Creek wildfire continues to burn and has grown to about 1,912 hectares.

Crews are responding to the blaze with 41 firefighters, four pieces of heavy equipment and three helicopters.

"Firefighters are mopping up and reinforcing along the fire guard from the Akokli Creek drainage to the western aspect, where the fire has come close to the containment line. A heavy equipment guard has been constructed from the Akokli Creek drainage," explained BCWF officials. "The fire currently remains within the containment lines. Due to increased fire behaviour in the early evening and into the night, crews will remain on-site to monitor the fire and action it where it is safe to do so."

The Bill Nye Mountain fire, about seven kilometers southeast of Wasa is estimated to be about 1,107 hectares in size.

Nearby properties are on an Evacuation Alert, while a handful of select properties are on Evacuation Order.

28 firefighters are responding to the fire with three pieces of heavy equipment and two helicopters.

A planned burn was scheduled for Sunday, and it only partially went through because of the day's conditions.

"Due to increased fire activity in the north part of the area, planned ignitions were halted. Ground crews will monitor and mop up the strengthen the anchor point on the south and southwest flanks. Crews will continue to line locate for heavy equipment to establish machine guards to protect structures along the west flank. Helicopters will continue bucketing to support ground crews. Aerial monitoring of the fire is ongoing. Heavy equipment is constructing a machine guard along the west and north flank and around structures," explained BCWS officials.

The restricted airspace includes a radius of five nautical miles around the fire and to an altitude of 3,000 feet above ground level. Transport Canada and the BC Wildfire Service explicitly prohibit the use of UAVs or drones of any size near a wildfire.

The Columbia Basin Economic Recovery Initiative has awarded the City of Fernie \$127,000.00 to employ eight people to create "shaded fuel brakes" in the community.

One of these will be built on 4.2 hectares near St. Margaret's Cemetery and another one to be built on 1.6 hectares near Mount Fernie Provincial Park.

Both of these areas have bene identified as high priorities for fuel treatment in the City of Fernie Wildfire Protection Plan. The program they are planning for these areas is expected to improve public safety, fire suppression abilities, while supporting improved wildlife habitat. The project is expected to begin this fall.

Mayor Ange Qualizza said, "This is wonderful news, especially as we face a Provincial State of Emergency this wildfire season. I want to congratulate Chief Ruiter, the team, and recognize the community champions that have helped advance the FireSmart program locally for over six years now."

Fire Chief Ted Ruiter added, "We want to thank the province and the Trust for funding this important project. This fuel management initiative is an excellent addition to our FireSmart program, helps protect our community, and provides valuable local employment."



Phase 2 Water Restriction Hits Cranbrook

THE ONGOING HEATWAVE DOESN'T LOOK TO BE LETTING UP ANYTIME SOON AND WITH NO RAINFALL IN SIGHT.

Expect water restrictions to come down from your local municipalities soon, Cranbrook will be implementing phase 2 of their water restrictions. Residents are being asked to reduce their water usage by following the below restrictions:

If you live in an even-numbered property, you can water your property on Thursdays and Sundays. If you live in an odd-numbered property, you can water your property on Tuesdays and Saturdays. During these days, watering can occur between the hours of 4:00am-11:00am and 7:00pm-11:00pm. There is no watering allowed on Wednesdays and Fridays.

While the city is still implementing a water restriction on residents, the Public Works Manager with the City of Cranbrook commented on seeing a slight reduction in usage over the past week. However, there is still more that needs to be done as the water from the City's two Watersheds is depleting.

The Phillips Reservoir will be monitored daily by city staff as it is below its regular level.

ELK VALLEY REGIONAL PARK MANAGEMENT PLAN



BIKER GANG WAR IN CRANBROOK

On July 23rd at approximately 7pm, Cranbrook RCMP attended a local gas station on Cranbrook Street North after a report of multiple people fighting.

Front line officers immediately flooded the area and separated the two groups when they then identified one to be a rival outlaw motorcycle gang from Alberta. Five people were hospitalized with stab wounds after the gang war broke out with one of the gangs being escorted out of town by the RCMP.

Officers attended East
Kootenay Regional Hospital
and placed it under temporary
lockdown while the injured
parties were being treated.
Their injuries have been
reported as non-life
threatening. No arrests have
been made at this time and
the investigation is ongoing by
the Cranbrook RCMP General
Investigation Section, with
support from the Combined
Forces Special Enforcement
Unit of British Columbia.

The gangs involved in this incident have not been identified nor additional details regarding where they are based. RCMP is asking anyone who may have witnessed this incident to contact them at 250-489-3471.



CRANBROOK RECEIVING SUPPORT TOWARDS DRUG OVERDOSES

The provincial government has provided the City of Cranbrook funding towards a community action team to assist with the overdose crisis.

The province has provided a total of \$2.5 million in funding across the province with 36 teams in total. These teams are out there saving lives by distributing naloxone and providing peer support along with overdose prevention services. These support teams will be established in the Central Coast Regional District and Cranbrook.

Existing teams will receive funding to continue supporting drug overdose prevention in their communities.

"More than ever, people who use substances need services in their community, along with systems supports," said Melinda Markey, executive director, Community Action Initiative.

"This investment recognizes that local involvement, especially when led by people with lived experience, helps people access the care and support they need and builds a strong, supportive community."


Established in February 2018, the community action teams were created in response to the ongoing drug poisoning crisis with chemicals such as fentanyl.

B.C. GOVERNMENT INCREASES MINIMUM WORKING AGE

The province of British Columbia was the only one in Canada that allowed children 12 and older to be employed.

However, the provincial government has now adjusted the general working age from 12 to 16 years old to protect youth from certain workplace environments. This doesn't mean youth between 12-16 can't work, it just means there's only certain jobs they can be involved with.

Youth aged 14 and 15 can participate in "light work" as defined below, provided parental permission if provided.

- Lifeguarding
- Caddying
- Light Farming
- · Yard Work
- Retail Work
- Food Service

Youth under the age of 14 can work in businesses and farms owned by an immediate family member, provided the appropriate safety criteria is met. The province is also looking to define the term "hazardous work" for employed youth between 16 and 18 years of age. This change will come into effect on October 15th, 2021 which will give employers and youth working outside of these conditions enough time to adjust.




