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OVERDOSES RUNNING RAMPANT IN BC

THE NUMBER ONE CAUSE OF DEATH FOR BC RESIDENTS AGED 19 TO 39 YEARS OLD IS DRUG TOXICITY.

BETWEEN JANUARY AND JUNE OF THIS YEAR AT LEAST 1,011 BC RESIDENTS HAVE DIED FROM SUSPECTED ILLICIT DRUG TOXICITY AND THE NUMBERS CONTINUE TO RISE.

159 people in British Columbia died from drug toxicity in June alone which marks the ninth month in a row the province has seen over 150 deaths in a month. As of this writing, 381 people between 19 and 39 years old have been killed due to overdosing from toxic drugs. Nine of those people are from the East Kootenays.

To give you an idea of how much of an increase this is, the first six months of 2020 saw 757 people in the province die from drug toxicity. A report released by the BCCS states that fentanyl is the major cause of drug toxicity deaths across the province with it being detected in 85% of deaths this year.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, the chief coroner of BC Coroners Service, Lisa Lapointe, had the following statement to share regarding the alarming increase of drug toxicity deaths,

"The deaths of more than 1,000 British Columbians in the first six months of 2021 is a tragic reminder that the toxic illicit drug supply remains a significant ongoing threat to public health and safety in communities throughout our province. The data released today highlights the immensity of this public health emergency and the need for a wide-scale response. This includes removing barriers to safe supply, ensuring timely access to evidence-based affordable treatment and providing those experiencing problematic substance use with compassionate and viable options to reduce risks and save lives."

ANYONE WHO IS IN NEED OF MENTAL HEALTH OR SUBSTANCE USE SUPPORT CAN VIEW ALL SUUPORT CENTRES IN THE PROVINCE <u>HERE</u> August 31st was International Overdose Awareness Day which is when the report by the BCCS was released. An event was held to mark the day and honour those who lost their lives from drug toxicity. The event took place on August 31st from 12pm to 4pm and was hosted by the East Kootenay Network of People Who Use Drugs (EKNPUD) along with ANKORS. The event is a remembrance ceremony of sorts for those who have been impacted by substance use and those who have died because of it.

The rise of drug toxicity deaths across the province is alarming. Overdose alerts are issued as closed to our communities as Cranbrook. These numbers have continued to steadily rise over the years and the impact of the global pandemic did nothing to help the problem. In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Executive Director and Project Coordinator for EKNPUD, Patrick Evans, provided the following statement on discussing the problem, changing policies to create safer streams for those addicted to substances, and finding solutions that save lives,

"We're in the middle of an ongoing drug poisoning crisis and we're here to raise awareness in the community to start a conversation about solutions to this crisis. It's a memorial because we've lost a lot of members of our organization as well as community members to preventable deaths. My drug of choice is criminalized, so luckily I'm on a safe supply. Luckily I have access to opioid agonist therapy and that keeps me able and functional, a lot of people don't have the privilege or ability to access those services and they're forced to access the street supply."

The event featured drug checking by ANKORS for those who wish to test their drugs and ensure there was no toxicity found. Naloxone training was also provided along with community resources and a memorial service for the lives lost to substance use and drug toxicity. This event and the grants/initiatives being provided by the province are in efforts to raise awareness for substance use and drug toxicity. The government also provides safe resources for substance users to try and prevent them from utilizing the illegal drug market which is where the majority of drug toxicity deaths arise.

COVID-19 CASES CONTINUE TO RISE

The global pandemic has yet to cease and we continue to see a rise of cases across the East Kootenays with 230 cases reported last week alone.

Cranbrook continues to see the highest number of cases in the East Kootenays with 69 cases reported last week and Creston reporting 53 new cases in the same week. In Elk Valley, 42 new cases have been reported, 38 new cases in and around the area of Golden, 18 new cases reported in the area of Kimberley, and 10 new case in the area of Windermere.

In recent weeks, the highest number of new COVID-19 cases to come from the province have come out of the Interior Health region with the highest saturation being in the Okanagan area. Currently, there are 50 people being treated for COVID-19 in the Interior Health region with 36 of them in intensive care which brings the total number of infections in the region to 2,299. The forecast by the federal government also shows that the country may be in for a very difficult fall should cases not see a downward trend. The latest modeling data presented by Chief Public Health Officer Dr. Theresa Tam shows an alarming trend of approximately four times the amount of daily cases the country is currently experiencing, starting in October. The short-term data shows the country's case count continues to rise by 5,000 cases a day and is steadily increasing. The only way to soften the blow and hopefully not engage another country-wide shutdown is for citizens to receive the vaccinations.

In response to the rise of COVID-19 many have looked to alternate solutions to treat and fight off COVID-19. However, it is highly recommended to only utilize approved treatments for COVID-19. Health Canada is urging Canadians to not use human or veterinary grade ivermectin to prevent or treat the COVID-19 virus. This warning came in response to reports that many people began utilizing the anti-parasitic drug in efforts to fight off the virus. It's been reported by livestock supply stores in the East Kootenays that they have either sold out or have had to implement screening questions for customers to ensure they were utilizing ivermectin appropriately. One store has mentioned they have stopped selling it entirely to prevent humans from purchasing it for their own use.

In a statement reported by

<u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Health Canada officials released the following statement on utilizing ivermectin for COVID-19,

"There is no evidence that ivermectin in either formulation is safe or effective when used for those purposes. The human version of ivermectin is authorized for sale in Canada only for the treatment of parasitic worm infections in people. Health Canada is closely monitoring all potential therapeutic treatments for COVID-19, including treatments being studied in international clinical trials. To date, Health Canada has not received any drug submission or clinical trial application for ivermectin for the prevention or treatment of COVID-19. Should a manufacturer provide a submission to Health Canada related to the use of ivermectin to prevent or treat COVID-19, Health Canada would conduct a scientific evaluation of the evidence to determine the drug's quality, safety and effectiveness."

Officials from Health Canada have said ivermectin can cause serious health problems such as vomiting, diarrhea, low blood pressure, dizziness, seizures, coma, and even death, especially at high doses. Those who have purchased ivermectin for preventative measures or treatment of COVID-19 are urged to stop and dispose of the contents immediately. Any health concerns or side effects from taking ivermectin can be reported to a health care professional or Health Canada.

BEARS, OH MY!

While you're taking in the last days of summer and enjoying the crisp start to fall, keep your eyes out while on trails and in the backcountry this month. A change in temperatures this summer may bring an increase of bear sightings in our community.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Community Coordinator for Cranbrook and Kimberley WildSafe BC, Danica Roussy, is predicting a higher number of bear encounters in Cranbrook and Kimberley this September. The heat and extreme drought we experienced this summer brings a high potential for more bears to be spotted around these areas this month.

"Many communities in B.C. are reporting an increase in conflicts. Historically, September is the month where you see the most conflict in terms of bears, and this is an annual, recurring thing. We are expecting more conflict to arise earlier this year. Bears are highly dependent on berries from late summer to fall to help prepare for winter. Due to fires, their crops might have been burned, or the berries may have dried up. Bears need to consume around 20,000 calories during this time of year. Bears are used to feeding on these berries, but they might not be there. You might see them coming into city limits looking for alternatives, like apples."

The rise in bear sightings will come as the bears begin to hunt for food sources such as fruit trees and bird feeders. Bears can also become used to living in human environments which leads to them posing a grave danger to people, especially if they are food-motivated. Any residents who have spotted a bear are highly encouraged to report it immediately to the Conservation Officer Service RAPP line.

For a realtime map of potential and actual bear sightings, make sure to check out the <u>W.A.R.P. (Wildlife Alert Reporting Program) provided by</u> <u>WildSafeBC</u> (shown below is the most recent map as of Sept 7, showing sightings in the last week.)

Keeping wildlife wild and communities safe



BC is Wildlife Country



Stay safe and help keep wildlife wild.



Avoid surprise encounters. Make noise by clapping your hands and using your voice. Watch for scat and other signs of wildlife. Avoid walking alone, carry bear spray and know how to use it.



Keep pets on a leash in wildlife country. Not only can dogs displace wildife, dogs that chase after bears can bring them back to their owners or be killed. Wolves and coyotes can perceive dogs as a potential threat or prey.



Keep a safe distance. View and photograph wildlife from a safe and respectful distance of at least 100m for bears and at least 30m for other large non-predatory animals. If you cause an animal to move, you are too close.



Respect wild animals. Never feed wildlife and always keep attractants secure and out of reach. Feeding wildlife can lead to conflicts and tragic consequences.

you encounter a bear:

Stay calm, do not yell or run. Speak in a low voice. If you have bear spray, pull it out and remove the safety.

- Move away slowly. If the bear charges, stand your ground and discharge the bear spray.
- 😕 Leave the area slowly and report the encounter.

Provincial State of Emergency Extended

THE PROVINCE HAS BEEN UNDER A STATE OF EMERGENCY SINCE AROUND THE START OF SUMMER TIME IN EFFORTS TO COMBAT THE EVER-RAGING WILDFIRES THROUGHOUT THE PROVINCE.



With firefighters from around the country continuing to put in efforts to stop the spread of wildfires, the B.C. government has made another extension to the province-wide state of emergency. This extension goes until at least September 14th, 2021 with a high chance of it being extended should the wildfire situation not ease up.

A wildfire was reported on Monday, September 6th and was responded to by firefighters with the BC Wildfire Service. The wildfire sparked in the Peavine Creek area which is southwest of Cranbrook. The fire is said to have broke out on Sunday and believed to be related to human interaction and is currently estimated to be 0.6 hectares in size. It's important as residents and visitors to the province that you take the utmost care in disposing of anything flammable. Whether it be a cigarette butt, a flammable substance, or an item that can hold a flame, do not dispose of it outside near dry areas. This can easily spark a wildfire and cause massive damage not only to our environment but our properties and lives.

As of August 31st, 233 wildfires were reported to be burning in the province with 21 evacuation orders currently impacting approximately 3,754 properties in British Columbia. Provincial officials are closely monitoring the wildfires and have noted a downwards trend, however, conditions can change and lead to severe fire behaviour rather rapidly. This means the chance of evacuations is high and can be imminent. If you are in an area that is close to wildfires, make sure you are prepared in the event of an imminent evacuation order.

This generous donation comes after many have lost their jobs across the province due to instability of the lumber market. The wildfires rampaging across the province has impacted tens of thousands of residents across British Columbia.
