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TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION SEPTEMBER 30TH 2021 MARKS THE

SEPTEMBER 30th, 2021 MARKS THE FIRST
TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION DAY. A FEDERAL
HOLIDAY PUT IN PLACE BY THE FEDERAL
GOVERNMENT ON JUNE 3, 2021.

This day is to honour and pay tribute to the children who's remains were found at Indian Residential Schools and those who survived the horrible cultural genocide. The new federal statutory holiday was put through with legislative amendments made by Parliament and received Royal Assent as Bill C-5 on June 3, 2021.

The remains of more than 1,800 children have been found, so far, in unmarked graves underneath former residential school sites across the country. These findings left the country in a state of mourning with the communities impacted looking for answers. Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau has pledged to take "concrete action" towards supporting the Indigenous communities in the search of missing children at residential schools. The Canadian Government in 2009 was previously requested by Indigenous communities to search the graves with a funding price tag of \$1.5 million, which was denied, after a formal apology regarding residential schools was provided by the government in 2008.

In 2015, the residential school systems were determined to be a "cultural genocide" by the truth and reconciliation commission. Those on this commission collected thousands of hours worth of testimony from residential school survivors. The truth and reconciliation commission existed from 2008 to 2015 providing a platform for those directly impacted by the Indian Residential Schools policy to share their stories and experiences. The statements, documents, and other materials gathered by this commission, along with its library and collections, are the foundation of the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation. Ongoing learning and research is the key focus of the centre to educate those on the tragedy of Indian Residential Schools. These recent unmarked graves being found across the nation have sparked further outrage from communities across the country, and the world. Indigenous leaders are calling for an independent investigation, including possible criminal charges against both the Canadian Government and the Catholic church

Truth and Reconciliation day also coincides with Orange Shirt Day which is an Indigenous-led grassroots day of tribute to honour the children who survived the residential schools while remembering those who did not survive. Orange Shirt Day is inspired by the experience of Phyllis Webstad, a Northern Secwpemc from the Stswecem'c Xga'tem First Nation. On her first day of attending residential schools, she was dressed in a brand new orange shirt which was immediately taken away from her. The orange shirt has now become a symbol of culture being stripped away along with the freedom and self-esteem of Indigenous children across generations.

On September 30th, Truth and Reconciliation day, it's encouraged to wear orange and raise awareness for the tragic legacy of Indian Residential Schools and honour the survivors. The City of Cranbrook will be closing all non-essential services in honour of the federal holiday. Services such as recycling and garbage collection will continue to operate as scheduled.

In a statement reported by myeastkootenaynow.com, the City of Cranbrook Mayor, Lee Pratt, released the following statement on recognizing the national holiday,

"Recognition of the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation by the City of Cranbrook is another important step forward in our ongoing commitment to further grow our relationship with our Ktunaxa Nation neighbors. We stand with the Ktunaxa Nation not only on this day, but each day as we work toward a better future together."

Members of the City of Cranbrook and Ktunaxa Nation met to discuss the option of holding a join community event to commemorate the first Truth and Reconciliation Day. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 restrictions, it was decided to not hold the event this year.


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

THE CITY OF CRANBROOK IS GETTING READY FOR A DOWNTOWN REVAMP.

As part of the City of Cranbrook's Strategic Plan for 2020-2024, they are reviewing the downtown community and will be forming a Downtown Revitalization Master Plan. City officials will be soon looking for feedback from residents and stakeholders to help shape this plan into something that's effective for the community.

While reviewing the downtown community, city officials highlight the importance of parking and redevelopment opportunities which all will feed into developing the Downtown Revitalization Master Plan. When discussing the revitalization of a downtown community on a scale the size of the City of Cranbrook, staff highlight how critical the regeneration process. Specifically, retaining the original charm of Cranbrook's downtown community and what is working while improving areas that need to be refreshed.

In a statement released by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, the City of Cranbrook's Manager of Planning, Rob Veg, had the following comments on the plan,

"This process will allow the City to take a comprehensive look at the downtown from a land use, infrastructure, social and cultural perspectives with a goal to develop a vision and plan on how the City wants downtown to look and feel moving into the future."

City of Cranbrook officials mention that revitalizing the downtown community will take time and planning, along with the appropriate research, analysis of current conditions, and understanding what the vision is for the downtown community for the future. The plan will incorporate accurate analysis and recommendations from the community and stakeholders while taking into account economy, housing, population, and land use.

There has been no word on when these engagement sessions with residents or other feedback opportunities will be available.

ZONING BYLAW UPDATE

The Village of Radium Hot Springs is in the process of updating its Zoning Bylaw and we want to hear from you!

What Is A Zoning Bylaw?

A Zoning Bylaw is a set of specific rules that regulate how land can be used and what can be built. The Zoning Bylaw is made up of two parts – the zoning map and regulations. The map divides the community into different zones and the regulations identify what uses are permitted in each zone, as well as the rules that buildings and structures must adhere to such as height, setbacks, and density.

SUPPORTING THE EDUCATION OF YOUNG WOMEN

College of the Rockies will be supporting youth education in Kenya.



24 training programs will be introduced with the assistance of Canadian institutions between August 2021 and September 2024. The training programs are developed towards producing work-ready graduates while expanding industry engagement and strengthen gender equality and inclusion efforts.

This initiative was created from a partnership between Colleges and Institutes Canada and the Mastercard Foundation as part of a five-year initiative. The end result aims to increase the youth workforce in the manufacturing, affordable housing, universal health coverage, and food security sectors in Kenya. The initiative also works towards establishing policies and procedures that will ensure safe learning environments while providing gender equality to those involved.

In a statement reported by <u>e-know.ca</u>, College of the Rockies President and CEO, Paul Vogt, had the following comments,

"We have a long history of supporting educational needs in East Africa and look forward to continuing this work alongside BCIT and Lakeland College. Education is key to growing industry in Africa and to creating sustainable careers for young African women and men and we're excited to play a role in creating these opportunities."

The participation in this initiative by the College of the Rockies will enable trades instructors and other staff members to share expertise and knowledge with Kenyan partners. At the same time, enhancing their own intercultural competencies and global awareness.

Have your voice heard on permanent paid sick leave.

The B.C. government is reaching out to its residents asking for their thoughts on three possible options they are looking to implement in regards to permanent paid sick leave. The first phase of the consultation, which is where the provincial government reaches out to the public for feedback, will shape the options being provided.

Between August 5th and September 14th, workers and employers have completed over 26,000 surveys sharing their thoughts on permanent sick leave in the province. The options provided on the survey involve how many days should be covered by paid leave. Those who take part in the survey will have the option to choose whether paid leave should cover a minimum of three, five, or ten days to choose from.

The end result of the survey is to create a program that allows workers to take the time they need away from work. Whether that be to recover from an injury or sickness, without having to worry about losing their pay.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Minister of Labour, Harry Bains, had the following comments,

"Thousands of workers and employers have completed surveys to give us valuable information on their current sick-leave benefits, if any, and what is needed. Informed by those surveys, we are inviting British Columbians to once again have their say. One of the most critical lessons from the pandemic has been the importance of people staying home when they are sick. No one should have to choose between going to work sick or losing wages. Paid sick leave is good for businesses, good for workers and good for our communities."

The new paid sick leave program is expected to be launched for January 1, 2022 and the survey of residents is being held until October 15th. Anyone who wants to have their voice heard can find the survey here https://engage.gov.bc.ca/paidsickleave/

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VALLEY PROMOTIONS



At the headwaters of the Columbia River in the Rocky Mountain Trench you will find Canal Flats; A village resilient, despite the ever-changing global climate.

In 2015, the village's 100-year-old sawmill shut down which many had assumed would bring an end to the small village town. However, a group of entrepreneurs working with the Kutnaxa people banded together for a plan to bring the village back to life.

Once the sawmill closed down in 2015, BC entrepreneur, Brian Fehr, purchased approximately 1,000 acres of land to co-found what is known as the Columbia Lake Technology Center (CLTC). This "innovation hub" is described as a brave experiment being aimed to attract technology and manufacturing businesses to Canal Flats. The CLTC opened its door on June 12, 2018 and continues to remain a part of the village today.

Another company who owns a large portion of the Columbia Lake Technology Center is Australian based company, Iris Energy, who Brian Fehr is also a strategic shareholder of. On July 21, 2021 they announced a collaboration to develop a "high-tech bitcoin and data centre operation" within the abandoned lumber mill in Canal Flats. Along with this announcement, a generous contribution of \$500,000 was provided to four Ktunaxa First Nations communities, intended to show monetary good will.

If you live in Canal Flats, this may not be news to you, as leading up to the actualization of these developments, the representatives advised the local community that these propositions and changes will bring more jobs into the local economy. We'll put a pin in that for a moment and discuss Bitcoin and Bitcoin Mining in general.

It's a fact that British Columbia utilizes green energy and renewable resources to provide power. This is part of what makes bitcoin mining so enticing in rural communities across the province, it's cheap and less of an environmental impact than most areas of the world. Though, just because you can doesn't mean you should.

In a quote given to the <u>University of British Columbia</u>, Werner Antweiler, an economics professor at the University of British Columbia shares insights behind the economic impact of Bitcoin Mining in rural communities.

"We really want to create jobs and create economic activity and benefit communities, and it's far from clear that is the case with bitcoin operations because they employ very few people, and basically all the benefits go to those companies."

Bitcoin mining brings little to no economic benefit to the community it's being mined in yet drains ample renewable energy from the province, the same energy that's needed to meet climate change goals. Mining bitcoin consumes a ridiculous amount of energy, a single bitcoin transaction consumes the equivalent of approximately 53 days of average household power usage. The bitcoin network, as a whole uses close to 115 terawatt per hour of energy per year, meaning bitcoin mining alone uses more energy per year than most of the countries in the world. Keep in mind how much of our renewable energy is being used for a product that is not in general use or circulation. Not to mention Bitcoin being recently declared illegal for use and mining in China, one of the worlds largest crypto-currency markets. This effectively plummeted the value of Bitcoin, which in turn loses profits for those in the industry, including Iris Energy.

Co-Founder of Iris Energy, Daniel Roberts, commented on the impact Bitcoin Mining operations has on the environment. Here is his statement as reported on <u>Bloomberg</u>,

"I don't think it's up to any individual to decide where energy should be used. It's a marketbased decision where Bitcoin, by virtue of the attraction and adoption its gained, is commanding that level of energy to secure it, to secure people's savings."



In a time where people are asked to limit their use of power between certain hours of the day or can't use their heaters/air-conditioners during temperature snaps because of a lack of available power, why should bitcoin mining operations get the priority? People need access to energy for their quality of life. They have a right to be able to access that power.

The price of Bitcoin continues to decline, recently dropping from \$45,000 to \$40,000 per bitcoin. Crypto-currency also dropped under \$30,000 in July. The crypto-currency and crypto-mining market is extremely volatile with no definitive long-term ROI and a very high risk to those financially involved. Which begs the questions, if these operations are so volatile, is it wise or even recommended to waste community energy and resources on something that benefits so few?

The community of Canal Flats has a rich history, a healthy community, and people who want to see improvement to their quality of life. That's why there are many, both silent and vocal, who oppose this project and the people who run it. CLTC takes great strides to present themselves in a certain light; as champions for the economy and people of Canal Flats. Which makes it even more baffling as to why CLTC insists on a Bitcoin Mining operation over more sustainable, environmentally friendly operations. With the field of technology growing exponentially with innovation sparking left, right and center, why is a resource sucking, low-employment opportunity project like bitcoin their go-to? Why did they choose to invest in a volatile, lottery-based, solution that *may* bring some sort of economic stimuli to the Village of Canal Flats rather than something that would create jobs, respect the land and environment, and position them as leaders in tech?

Bitcoin Mining only benefits those who are directly involved – the few employees and the ones making all the money. Should the Canadian government follow China's example, what will happen to the bitcoin op and the people of Canal Flats?



BC is Wildlife Country













Stay safe and help keep wildlife wild.



Avoid surprise encounters. Make noise by clapping your hands and using your voice. Watch for scat and other signs of wildlife. Avoid walking alone, carry bear spray and know how to use it.



Keep pets on a leash in wildlife country. Not only can dogs displace wildife, dogs that chase after bears can bring them back to their owners or be killed. Wolves and coyotes can perceive dogs as a potential threat or prey.




Keep a safe distance. View and photograph wildlife from a safe and respectful distance of at least 100m for bears and at least 30m for other large non-predatory animals. If you cause an animal to move, you are too close.



Respect wild animals. Never feed wildlife and always keep attractants secure and out of reach. Feeding wildlife can lead to conflicts and tragic consequences.

f you encounter a bear:

- Stay calm, do not yell or run. Speak in a low voice. If you have bear spray, pull it out and remove the safety.
- Move away slowly. If the bear charges, stand your ground and discharge the bear spray.
- Leave the area slowly and report the encounter.
- Bear attacks are rare but be prepared. Learn more about bears, bear spray and other wildlife safety at

DARKEST DUNGEON IS A ROGUE-RPG YOU SHOULDN'T SLEEP ON.

Xbox Game Pass has provided gamers with the opportunity to access games they most likely would not have played otherwise. In today's day where games are released while still in development or even worse, released with bugs (looking at you CD Projekt RED), it's difficult to spend \$50-\$70 on a video game you're not familiar with. Personally, I've been able to completely open my gaming tastes with the amount of options available through Xbox Game Pass. One of those games is Darkest Dungeon.

A rogue-RPG that brings the dungeon crawling experience to a new level, Darkest Dungeon allows you to recruit followers and bring a party of 4 with you on quests. Each quest is tiered based on the area level and can only be completed with characters tiered on the same level. When you bring these characters out on a quest with you, the opportunities are endless, and treasures are plentiful. However, there are many dangers present including turn-based battles and traps.

Before you head off on your journey, the opportunity to purchase items that will help you on your quest is available (provided you made enough gold in previous runs). These items can make or break that run and once your characters die, they're dead for good. While you can always recruit new characters after a dungeon run, any efforts you've put into upgrading and levelling up that character go into the trash. Trust me, I've experienced this heartbreak on more than one occasion.

Outside of the looting and dungeon crawling madness, the game also has a very interesting dynamic with the characters stress levels. The darker a dungeon is or the more hurt a character gets, their stress level begins to increase. Slowly driving the character into madness and inflicting ailments that could be detrimental to your party. Thankfully, ailments and stress levels can be cured through different activities when you're outside of questing. You can also upgrade your characters abilities, weapons, armor, and equip them with a variety of different trinkets.

Overall, the game is a classic dungeon crawler with rogue-RPG elements that make this a game you want to beat. Even though it is a rogue-RPG, there are still quest milestones to complete that will give you that sense of accomplishment in beating the game.



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


