Mask Mandate Extended

THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT HAS EXTENDED THE MASK MANDATE INDEFINITELY.

The province has been under a mask mandate in response to the increase of COVID-19 cases which was set to expire on October 31st, 2021. The mandate requires masks to be worn in all indoor public spaces through British Columbia. The order has now been extended with no end date provided to continue to reduce the transmission of COVID-19.

In a statement released by the B.C. Government in a <u>news release</u>, the provincial health office Dr. Bonnie Henry had the following comments,

"The requirement to wear masks in indoor public spaces is being extended during this time of higher transmission of COVID-19 in communities. This important layer of protection will help make all of us safer, along with practicing hand hygiene regularly, staying away if sick and, most importantly, getting fully vaccinated."

The indoor mask mandate applies to people five years of age and older, regardless of your vaccination status. The types of settings included in this mandate are:

malls, shopping centres, coffee shops and retail and grocery stores;

liquor and drug stores;

airports, city halls, libraries, community and recreation centres;

restaurants, pubs and bars (unless seated);

on public transportation, in a taxi or ride-sharing vehicle;

areas of office buildings where services to the public are provided;

common areas of sport and fitness centres when not engaged in physical activity;

common areas of post-secondary institutions and non-profit organizations; and

inside schools for all K-12 staff, visitors and students.

Masks may be removed temporarily in certain situations when within indoor public places such as identifying an individual, consuming food or beverage, participating in a sport or fitness activity, or while receiving personal or healthcare services that require the mask to be removed. Those who are unable to wear a mask or cannot apply one without assistance are exempt from this mandate.

The extension of the indoor mask mandate coincides with the release of the Canadian COVID-19 proof of vaccination which is required for anyone traveling by air, rail, or cruise ship. Fully vaccinated is defined by having both federally approved doses of the COVID-19 vaccine with the second dose administered 14 days prior to travel. Travelers who are not vaccinated will be subject to testing requirements and mandatory quarantine when returning to the country. In a statement reported by

<u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Minister of Health Adrian Dix had the following comments on the rollout of the new mandate,

"The federal government is launching a proof of vaccination card to ensure that people who want to travel have what they need to do so. The federal card can be accessed in the same way as the BC Vaccine Card, which 3.7 million British Columbians have downloaded to enjoy non-essential activities throughout our province, such as dining in restaurants or attending a sporting event. By ensuring all of us are fully vaccinated, we can do more with the people we love, safely."

The British Columbia Vaccine Card will still be utilized for non-essential settings across the province including restaurants and indoor/outdoor events. You can learn more about attaining the federal proof of vaccination <u>HERE</u>.

Arts and Sports Funding Coming

THE PROVINCE WILL DISTRIBUTE FUNDING TO OVER **1,300** ORGANIZATIONS.

The provincial government has announced it will be providing \$18.2 million towards the arts and \$24.9 million towards sports to allow those in the province to be more active and creative.

Locally, we will be seeing some of that funding with the Columbia Valley Arts Council receiving \$29,000 of funding to put towards their programs and initiatives. Cranbrook and District Arts Council will be receiving \$16,500 in funding, Cranbrook Archives, Museum and Landmark Foundation will receive \$43,900 in funding, Cranbrook Community Theatre Society will be receiving \$10,000 in funding and Symphony of the Kootenays Association is set to receive \$19,200 in funding.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Minister of Municipal Affairs Josie Osborne shared the following comments on the funding,

"Activities that engage people of all ages to play sports, enjoy arts programs and celebrate cultural festivities are at the heart of B.C.'s thriving and resilient communities. Community Gaming Grants continue to provide critical funding for these community-based programs that support British Columbians and help them make strong community connections."

Other organizations included in receiving funding are the Nelson and District Arts Council, Cranbrook Minor Hockey Association, Selkirk Challengers Gymnastics Club, and Fernie Alpine Ski Team.

DECRIMINALIZING ILLICIT DRUGS

BC IS THE FIRST PROVINCE IN CANADA TO SEEK AN EXEMPTION FROM HEALTH CANADA.

The provincial government is looking at removing criminal penalties for people who possess small amounts of illicit drugs for personal use. The B.C. government is calling on federal officials as the first province in Canada to seek this exemption. The goal is to reduce the fear and shame associated with substance use which in turn prevents people from getting the proper care they need.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, B.C. chief coroner Lisa Lapointe had the following comments,

"Criminalizing members of our communities who use drugs has resulted in decades of causing further harms to many who are already suffering from mental or physical health challenges and/or the effects of emotional or physical trauma. Decriminalization will help shift our focus from punishment, which has resulted in social isolation, stigma and fear, toward a medical model that recognizes substance use as a health issue. This is an important step that, combined with increased access to safe supply and implementation of an evidence-based model of treatment and recovery, will help to save lives."

In developing the application to the federal government, the provincial government worked with health and social service providers, Indigenous partners, those impacted by substance abuse, municipalities, law enforcement, and clinical experts.

WANT A SHOT WITH THAT?

SINGLE-SERVE LIQUOR NOW AVAILABLE WITH TAKEOUT

AND DELIVERY.

Have you ever just wanted one drink with your meal instead of buying an entire bottle? Well, now you can! As of October 29th, 2021, the liquor and food-primary liquor licensees in the province are permitted to package and sell unmixed drinks for takeout and delivery with the purchase of a meal. Meaning, you can receive a shot of alcohol with a can of pop or just a single glass of wine with your meal.

In a statement released by the provincial government, the Public Safety and Solicitor General had the following comments,

"This additional choice for consumers builds on other measures government has approved in recent months to benefit approximately 2,000 liquor-primary and 6,000 food-primary licensees in B.C. Notably, they can already sell full bottles of wine and spirits as well as mixed drinks packaged in single servings for takeout and delivery with the purchase of a meal."

This change came in response to feedback from the Business Technical Advisory Panel and received support from manufacturers in the industry after extensive consultation. This builds on the governments promise to the industry with recent changes allowing many in the food and beverage industry to remain open during lockdown restrictions. It's also hoped this change will limit the health impacts associated with alcohol consumption.

The City of Fernie received funding from the Resort Municipality Initiative which is being put forth towards the development of the Annex Park Pavilion. Construction is expected to start this week and city officials expect it to be an exciting addition to their tourism and gathering spaces.

BINGO HELPING YOUTH

We encourage folks to gear drop Friday to reduce crowding. Please help us speed up the drop process by printing our gear form at home and filling it out in advance. \$1 fee per item, 20% commission (15% on items over \$500).

The sale opens to the public at 12:00 pm sharp and it will be busy! Pick up unsold gear after 3pm.

As per restrictions made by the Provincial Health Officer (PHO) and Interior Health Medical Health Officers under the Public Health Act everyone dropping gear or visiting the sale will need to wear a mask and those age 12+ will be required to show proof of vaccination.



VACCINATION REQUIRED FOR CANADIAN ROCKIES RESORTS

PROOF OF FULL VACCINATION REQUIRED FOR MOST SETTINGS IN THE PROVINCE.

As of October 24th, 2021 it is required to have both doses of the COVID-19 vaccine in order to be permitted to attend certain events and settings. This has permitted event restrictions to be eased as full capacity for indoor events is now allowed, the previous mandate allowed for 50% of the venue capacity. This does not impact capacity limits in place for certain regions where regional health orders are in place. The change to capacity for indoor events applies to indoor sporting events, concerts, theatre, movie theatres, dance and symphony events, organized events, weddings, and funerals.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Dr. Bonnie Henry hopes this is the first step to removing additional restrictions,

"We're hoping to leverage the benefits of the vaccine card, and this is an important first step of that. We'll be monitoring carefully and looking at whether we can take away additional restrictions, depending on how things evolve in the next few weeks,"

The federal government has also announced they are working on a standardized proof of vaccination system on a national level. This is to allow for international travel from anywhere in the country. The federal vaccine certificate has been introduced to eight provinces who have adapted the system with the remaining provinces expected to come on board by November 30th. The certificate is expected to include a QR code with minimal personal information.

Travelers will be required to provide proof of vaccination anytime they are traveling through the country by air, rail, or ship as of October 30th with a short transition period where travellers can provide a negative COVID-19 test within 72-hours of travel.

EXTREME Summer Heat of 2021

At least 595 people in the province died this summer due to extreme heat.

Between June 25th, 2021 and July 1st, 2021, the province saw the most deaths due to extreme heat as a heat dome weather event resulted in multiple instances of recordsetting temperatures. 526 people died during this even with several others following in the days and weeks to follow.

Throughout the province, the death rate averaged 10.1 per 100,000 residents with 69% of those deaths occurring in people 70 years of age and older. The Fraser and Vancouver Coastal health authority regions contained 75% of the deaths recorded between June 25th and July 1st. There were no reported deaths among children or youth.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Lisa Lapointe, Chief Coroner from BC Coroners Service, had the following comments,

"The BC Coroners Service is committed to gathering as much information as possible about each of these deaths to inform future, evidence-based prevention efforts. I extend my sincere condolences to all of those who lost a loved one as a result of last summer's unprecedented heat dome. By identifying patterns and factors in the tragic deaths that occurred unexpectedly last summer, our province will be in a better position to prevent future similar tragedies."

Individual investigation will be occurring on the 595 heatrelated deaths by early 2022 by the BC Coroners Service. Upon completion, a review panel is expected to create recommendations geared towards preventing similar deaths from re-occurring.
