

RUNNING OUT LOCALS

THE STATE OF AVAILABLE AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN THE VALLEY IS CAUSING MANY TO LEAVE AND SEEK RESIDENCE ELSEWHERE.

It's not news there is a housing crisis across the Columbia Valley. Between the lack of available housing, short-term rental market, and how expensive it can be to find a suitable living arrangement, many Columbia Valley residents are forced to leave the area to live elsewhere.

These concerns have been voice by the Union of B.C. Municipalities (UBCM), specifically in the direction of the short-term rental market that has impacted the local housing availability in communities across the province. Officials with the UBCM have filed 13 requests to the B.C. government in efforts to establish regulations surrounding the short-term rental industry, similar to regulations held by the ride-hailing/sharing industries.

Municipalities at this time have the power to regulate short-term rentals, though it's difficult to put regulations in place without accurate and complete data which is something not readily available to municipal governments. In order for regulations to be effective for everyone, it needs to be based off the data gathered from that specific community, similar to the feedback called on by both Invermere and Village of Radium Hot Springs have recently.



In a statement reported by myeastkootenaynow.com, co-chair of the Joint UBCM and Mayor of Whistler, Jack Crompton had the following comments on the short-term rental market,

"The short-term rental accommodation industry has grown exponentially over the last decade and it's largely unregulated. One of the consequences of that growth is that it has limited the supply of long-term rental homes. The lack of regulation means that it's a pretty lucrative choice and one that drives us away from housing residents in communities, which is really important in British Columbia at this time. Our hope is that this regulation will tamper the enthusiasm to convert long-term rental homes into short-term rentals. The goal is not to drive short-term rentals out of the province, but it is to come up with a rational solution so that a community's needs can be addressed and promoted."

The UBCM is calling for specific regulations from the provincial government including:

Regulatory framework province-wide for platform accountability and ensuring the information is validated for online accommodation platforms and short-term rentals.

All online accommodation platforms should be required to provide their data through a central provincial interface made available to municipal governments.

Requirements for short-term rentals on accommodation platforms to publish their business license or permit information directly with municipalities to prevent false information.

PST and MRDT collection at point of booking the short-term rental

Adjustments to the Municipal and Regional District Tax to offset impacts to housing and neighbourhoods from short-term rental licensing.

In efforts to help regulate short-term rentals in the Village of Radium Hot Springs, short-term rental licensing has been in effect with a \$10,000 fine handed out to violators of the regulation. You can apply HERE for a short-term rental license with fees of \$250 for new applications, \$150 for renewals, and \$100 for change of ownership.

It remains to be seen how the provincial government will respond to UBCM though regulations surrounding short-term rentals would be very welcomed by British Columbians.

BOXING CLUB HELPS COMMUNITY

\$15,500 HAS BEEN RAISED TO SUPPORT THE COMMUNITY IN CRANBROOK.

Cranbrook Eagles Boxing Club has raised \$15,500 to support people in their community, despite provincial regulations reducing the capacity size of their venues. A portion of the funds are being dedicated towards directly impacting several people in need with the rest up for discussion as to its designation.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Coach Tom White commented on the reduced capacity and how the funds raised will help support Cranbrook,

"This year we had to do a very scaled-down version by about a third of what normally have. We raised between \$30-\$40,000 consistently for the last six to seven years. This year, because the attendance was cut in half and we had to deal with the vaccination protocols, we had 130 people versus 330 people. We still managed to raise about \$18,000 and after some expenses, we're going to be dolling out about \$15,500. There are some people in the community that have some health issues they're dealing with. We're going to help them out with their expenses. We'll have a kind of committee meeting with our members and we'll decide where the rest of the money is handed out."

Fate was definitely on the side of Cranbrook Eagles Boxing Club as this event was close to being canceled, until Dr. Paul Kahlke volunteered last-minute to help support the fundraiser.



IT'S BEARY SEASON

SPARWOOD DISCUSSES SOLUTIONS ON THE INFLUX OF BEAR SIGHTINGS IN TOWN.

Mayor of Sparwood, David Wilks, has noted 2021 as a bad year for bear activity and the District Council is working on possible solutions to keep both their people and wildlife safe. With the summer 2021 season bringing hot and dry weather conditions, berry crops saw damage which impacts the bears food source.

Due to the lack of food available to bears, they've started to find their way into communities to find food. Fruit trees found around local communities provide a food source for bears which is lucrative and attractive for them to visit.

In a statement reported by myeastkootenaynow.com, Mayor Wilks had the following comments on the bear situation over the past year in Sparwood,

"The COs (Conservation Officers) have had to put down 14 bears so far this year. It's been a real struggle for us. There just wasn't the production of berries that there normally is. As a result, they become driven to find food, and the first thing they're trying to sense is fruit. Once they're driving into town, they find another food source, which is garbage. Once they get familiarized with it, they don't want to leave. Unfortunately for the COs, it puts them into a very difficult position. It's sad to hear from the COs that there is really only one option for them, and that is to shoot them."

Relocating the bears also proves a challenge since it requires manpower which local Conservation Officers don't have access to, and even so, the bears would likely find their way back to the site in search for food.

There are things we can do to help secure the well-being of bears in our community. Here is what you can do to prevent the attraction of bears to your community:

Place your garbage at the curb only in the morning of the designated collection day.

Keep all of your garbage within a secure enclosure.

Remove bird feeders or keep them high on a cable where bears can't reach it.

If you have fruit trees, pick the fruit as soon as they are ripe and remove any fallen fruit.

Keep any of your pets food, refrigerators, and freezers inside.

Clean barbecues after every use.

Put away all petroleum and rubber products as these attract bears.

In the event you experience a bear wandering around your neighbourhood or trash bin, make sure to give the bear lost of space and keep your pets inside. Should you witness the bear eating, let it finish as that is its first priority. Get yourself to a safe vantage point and make loud noises while waving your arms, letting the bear know they are not welcome. Once the bear has left, remove any attractants from the area and keep in mind it will likely return to check the source of food.

BOOSTER DOSES COMING TO THE PROVINCE

Invitations will be sent to those most at-risk first in the province.

British Columbia is moving forward with it's COVID-19 immunization plan with invitations to senior citizens and at-risk residents to register for a COVID-19 booster shot before the holiday season. The province will be expanding the plan to include all residents of the provinces aged 12 and older starting January 2022.

Booking for a booster can be done through the Get Vaccinated System and administration of these doses is underway for priority groups, such as long-term care and assisted living facilities. Those in shelters or at high risk of congregating in high-risk settings will also receive an invitation to get their booster dosage.

Invitations will continue to rollout based on risk and age, similar to the first and second doses of the vaccine. Invitations will start from oldest to youngest and follow from there based on risk and priority. The booster dose can be administered between six to eight months from receiving the second dose of the vaccine.

In a statement reported by the <u>Columbia Valley Pioneer</u>, Dr. Bonnie Henry, provincial health officer released the following statement on the booster dose,

"Our vaccines are highly effective. However, we are starting to see a gradual decline in protection over time. As a result, we are taking the proactive step of expanding boosters to everyone in our province. We're starting with the people who need them most to continue to do all we can to keep people in B.C. safe from this virus and its variants."

Children between the ages of five and eleven are still awaiting approval from Health Canada for vaccination. This program will involve a separate supply of vaccines designated and designed for children which will be delivered alongside the booster program. Parents who wish to register their children in advance can do so here.

ELIZABETH LAKE IMPROVEMENTS

The City of Cranbrook Public Works are hard at work on trail improvements to Elizabeth Lake. City of Cranbrook staff are removing wooden rails along the walkways and replacing the wood chips with crushed gravel. The improvements being made will create a similar look aesthetically to the Isadore Canyon trail and is expected to make maintenance of the trails easier for city staff.

WEATHER RESPONSE SHELTERS

Those in need have options for warm shelter this winter.

With the winter season fast approaching, the provincial government has opened temporary and emergency shelters across the province, including a location in Cranbrook.

Community Connections Society of Southeast BC in Cranbrook is the only location in the East Kootenay that will have available shelter spaces for those in need and will be available to those 19 years of age and older.

The temporary shelters will be open during the winter season every night with meals being provided to those in need. In addition, when an extreme weather alert is issued, extreme weather response shelters will be made available overnight. These shelters generally are set to open come November 1st, though additional provincial funding permitted the shelters to pen as early as October 1st for communities experiencing extreme weather.

COORDINATED EFFORTS LEAD TO SUCCESS

Emergency crews responded to a vehicle going over an embankment near Wardner on November 4th. An individual was trapped in the vehicle approximately 80 feet down the embankment where RDEK Fire Services, BCEHS, Cranbrook Highway Rescue3, and RCMP responded to the incident. The individual was rescued from the vehicle with the Jaws of Life utilized for the extraction. They were then raised towards the highway utilizing the rope rescue system and transported to the hospital by BCEHS.

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

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u> , Inspector Dale Carr, Officer in Charge of BCHP's Special Traffic Operations had the following comments on the seizure,
"The mandate of BCHP's TSU-PDS is to conduct high-volume traffic safety enforcement and, often, intelligence-led policing results in the interruption, interdiction and apprehension of traveling criminals. Frequently, investigators will find wanted persons, stolen property, drugs, weapons, cash and other contraband. By removing these individuals from our highways and disrupting their activity, we prevent this type of criminal behaviour from continuing and it is one of many ways we are making our highways safer together."
It's believed by the RCMP the suspects intended to avoid the liquor tax of the province and resell the liquor to private purchasers or illegally run casinos in the Lower Mainland. Both suspects have been released pending further investigation.

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
FANS SHOULD MATTER




