Standing With the **Ukraine**

The sovereign nation has been a victim of attacks from Russia since late last week.

A large-scale invasion of Ukraine was launched by Russia on February 24th, 2022 marking the first time the country has seen this level of attack since World War II.

Russia and Ukraine have been in a state of conflict since 2014 and the invasion was preceded by the build up of the Russian military in early 2021. At the time, the growth of NATO was criticized by Russian president Vladimir Putin as a threat to his country's security and demanded Ukraine be legally prohibited from joining.

It was around 05:00 EET (UTC+2) on February 24th when Putin announced a military operation taking place in eastern Ukraine where minutes later missiles could be heard hitting locations across the nation. Attacks included the capital, Kyiv and the border posts with Russia and Belarus. Hours later, Russian military troops began forcing their way into the country.

On February 28th, Ukraine and Russian officials met to discuss talks aimed towards ending the fight. Though, the first round of talks ended with no immediate agreements. The talks were held in the Gomel region of Belarus with delegations returning home to consult in their capitals. Following these discussions, Ukraine President Volodymyr Zelensky released photos alongside a signed European Union application, as reported by CBC.



Sanctions have been made towards Russia and it's people which have already shown devastating impacts. From economic an perspective, the European Union, United Kingdom, and Canada have come to an agreement on preventing Russian central bank from deploying hundreds of billions of dollars in its international reserves, among a number of other sanctions geared towards crippling their economy. **Political dignitaries attached** to the Russian government have also received sanctions towards themselves along with access to airspace through Russian airlines or private jets.

Ruble Plummets

With the sanctions posed against the Russian economical system, the ruble plummeting went which led many Russians trying to withdraw their funds. According to CBC, the ruble took a 30% drop against the U.S. dollar in early trading on February 28th. Western nations furthered their attempts at stopping Putin by blocking Russian banks from the SWIFT international system while payment restricting their use of it's foreign currency reserves. In response, the Russian central bank raised its key rate to 20% from 9.5% to bring some sort of stability to the economy, though only brought a temporary reprieve.





Kyiv Under Fire

The capital city of Kyiv in Ukraine continues to be under attack with troops scattered around the city. Citizens who stayed are being provided with weapons to defend themselves and their city. Prisoners with military experience in the Ukraine are also being released, should they choose to fight. The capital city was under a 40-hour curfew which lifted on February 28th and will resume each night between 10:00pm to 7:00am.



Protests in Russia

During a 4-day period from February 24-27 it is estimated that around 5,794 individuals in 53 cities across Russia were detained for protesting against the invasion. Despite being a direct violation of both the Russian constitution and international human rights laws, Putin has declared peaceful public protest without permission of the authorities illegal.

On the 27th, another 2,063 people were detained in the street protesting the war. Along with signs and candles, a van with markings that read "People, wake up!", "This is war", "Putin is a scum!" crashed and caught fire in Pushkinskaya Square.

More than 10,000 technology workers, 6,000 medical workers, over 3,400 architects,more than 2,000 actors, directors and other creative figures, and 1,500 teachers signed petitions calling for Putin's government to stop the war.

Over 60 Russian activists and journalists have been arrested. 147,000 Russians have signed a petition to impeach Putin.

Meeting Local Housing Needs

Cranbrook makes strides towards housing for the community.

The City of Cranbrook identified a need for more housing in the community and are working towards making it possible for its residents. The 2020 Housing Needs Report put together by the City of Cranbrook demographic highlighted the shift, specifically in relation to family sizing and people per household. A Development Variance Permit and a Development Permit was approved for a 71-unit apartment complex located at 4th St North. Approval was also received for an Official Community Plan and Zoning Amendments to allow for an additional 75-unit apartment complex located at 10th St North. The location will soon be back before council for a Development Permit and Development Variance Permit.

As reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Cranbrook Mayor Lee Pratt shared a statement on the new developments. "Developing new purpose-built rental units in Cranbrook geared toward young professionals and seniors is needed as many of Cranbrook's apartment units built in the 1970s and 1980s have been converted to strata taking them out of the rental pool. Once more new high quality rental units become available people will be able to move into the units freeing up spaces in older units."

Though these projects are top of mind for city staff, both projects will still require building permits prior to construction commencing. Though considering the needs of residents and the rise of homelessness in Cranbrook, city staff are moving swiftly to move the process along.

Protect the Bats

Researchers are asking for help.

Bats in the province are being threatened by disease and public help is being requested by the Kootenay Community Bat Program in collaboration with the Province of B.C.

Help is being requested to detect and prevent the spread of White-Nose Syndrome in bats. During the winter season bats should be hibernating and any that are observed or found sick or dead should be reported before May 31st. The disease is harmless to humans but has shown a devastating impact on bat populations across North America. The fungal disease attacks bats while hibernating and shows itself on their wings and faces, giving an appearance of a white nose. When the bat wakes to clean the fungus from their skin, their using valuable energy and can eventually die from hypothermia or starvation.

There are two species in the province listed as Endangered under the federal Species at Risk legislation. The Little Brown and Northern Bats who are part of the ecosystem as a key predator for invertebrate species and an essential part of the province's overall ecosystem.

White-Nose Syndrome was first detected in Seattle in 2016 and continues to spread across Washington State and making it's way towards our communities. It's challenging to detect the disease without help from the public as bats hibernate alone or in small groups across the province. Reports from the public could help prevent further loss of life for the species and mitigate the negative impacts on our wildlife.

B.C.'s **Economic Future**

Columbia River-Revelstoke MLA Doug Clovechok speaks out on the provincial budget.

The provincial government released their budget for 2022 on February 22 with the tagline "Stronger Together". A statement taken directly from the Strategic Plan on the B.C. budget website states,

"Budget 2022 keeps building on the progress we've made to make life more affordable and improve the services families count on. The strategic plan sets out the overarching vision, goals and priority actions for the Province of British Columbia."

MLA Doug Clovechok doesn't share the same perception as the NDP government when it comes to making life more affordable for British Columbians. In a statement reported by myeastkootenaynow.com, Clovechok shares his thoughts surrounding the new taxes being proposed by the NDP government.

"There's a brand new tax on online transactions,

they're increasing taxes on used cars, and they're increasing taxes on buying home heating systems that use fossil fuels, like natural gas furnaces. That's 27 new taxes since they took office. You can't tax your way to prosperity."

The strategic plan released by the provincial government paints a great picture for the future of B.C., should they be able to deliver what they're promising. Clovechok is skeptical and shares his thoughts on the lack of address towards the cost of living in the province, especially in the lower mainland.

"If you look at rent overall, it's increased by about \$2,800 per year under the NDP since 2017, especially in Vancouver. The price of everything has gone up and yet they are the party that said they're for affordability. It's really unfortunate, but this budget is a sham. As Kevin Falcon, our new leader said, if someone were to bring him a budget like this, he would fire them."



Clovechok and other B.C. Liberal MLAs will be taking the debate to the legislature to find a more common ground with revisions the party finds agreeable. He'll certainly have support from Kootenay East MLA Tom Shyptika who also shared his comments as <u>reported by</u> <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u> on the proposed budget by the NDP government.

"Some folks are just hanging on the edge and a lot of this stuff has just been regurgitated promises from the past like 114,000 affordable homes and \$10 a day daycare. A budget is to spend money, and that's public money, but what have they accomplished? It's more of the same over and over."

Though on the positive side of the budget, fire mitigation and disaster relief will see \$2.1 billion in funding, something the province has shown to be in desperate need of in the past few years. The funding will be distributed towards different areas over the next three years. \$1.5 billion will be dedicated towards flood recovery and supporting ongoing disaster response. \$83 million will be put towards climate change preparedness and expanding monitoring networks that will measure streamflow, groundwater, and other data.

The funding also includes \$145 million towards transforming the BC Wildfire Service into a firefighting and risk mitigation workforce all year-round.

A Terrifying Call

A phone call no parent wants to receive.

On February 27th, Cranbrook Citizen Rebecca Cayenne received a terrifying phone call. Her first born child had been involved in a car accident.

The accident in question took place on 7th Ave and 4th St in Cranbrook. A dark dodge ram allegedly ran through a stop sign at high speeds which impacted the vehicle of her child, AJ. The vehicle struck the passenger side of AJ's vehicle jumping it over a curb and into a snowbank. The offending vehicle was found to have almost entered right through the front door of someones home. Thankfully, no fatalities have been reported though injuries were sustained. AJ suffered a separated shoulder, torn ligaments, bruising, and emotional distress. In a statement made by Rebecca on Facebook, the driver of the offending vehicle was visibly drunk and allegedly said to AJ "you're fine, please don't call the cops" while sustaining injuries themselves. Paramedics, Fire Services, and RCMP arrived on scene swiftly to attend to the victims of the accident.

This is an alarming incident to happen so close to home. Whether you're in a big city or a small town, drunk driving is never the right thing to do. This situation could've ended very tragically because of someone's decision to drink and drive. Please, from all the volunteers at The Valley Voice, don't drink and drive.

Rapid Testing

The province is making rapid antigen tests more accessible.

As of February 25th, 2022 rapid antigen tests available for free through are now participating pharmacies across the province. The tests will be accessible to those 70 years of age and older to start. The tests have been sent by the Ministry of Health in collaboration with the BC Pharmacy Association to community pharmacies across the province. Those who are 70 years of age or older can access one kit every 29 days which contains five tests. In order to receive the kit you must present your personal health number or if on behalf of someone, must provide their name and date of birth.

In a statement reported by <u>myeastkootenaynow.com</u>, Adrian Dix, Health Minister shared the following comments on the rollout of rapid tests.

"Community pharmacies have played an important role in supporting people in B.C. throughout the COVID-19 pandemic by providing vaccinations and now distributing rapid tests. Our expanded test availability means more people will be able to access rapid tests to use to understand their own symptoms and illness and to take action to limit transmission to their friends, family and work."

Over 865,000 kits have been distributed with millions more to be arriving in the coming weeks.
